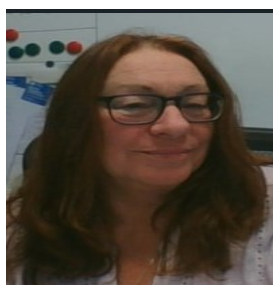

Speakers



Rowe is a canine behaviourist and the founder of Mindfulness4Dogs,

Darran Rowe is a canine behaviourist and the founder of Mindfulness4Dogs, based in Taranaki, New Zealand. He is currently in the dissertation year of the MSc in Clinical Animal Behaviour at the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies, University of Edinburgh, where his study builds on more than twenty years of applied behaviour work across the United Kingdom, Europe, and New Zealand.

His field experience spans the full spectrum of the human–dog relationship, from private behaviour cases to frontline work alongside Dog Control and the SPCA, giving him a working knowledge of the dogs that reach animal management services and the circumstances that put them there.

His clinical interest is the owner–dog dyad as the functional unit of behaviour change: how the handler's own state, consistency, and understanding shape a dog's behavioural outcomes, and how that relationship in turn measurably affects the owner's daily life and wellbeing.

Brad Dannefaerd – Situational Safety & Tactical Communications Expert - CERT



Brad spent 20 years as a Fishery Officer and Trainer with NZ Fisheries.

During his time with Fisheries, he had the opportunity to work throughout NZ as well as working alongside agencies in Australia, Canada and the United States.

He was a member of the Combined Law Agency Group (CLAG), a government inter-agency group that works together to target persons of interest.

In 2005 Brad was appointed as National Coordinator of the Officer Safety Programme with responsibility for all operational safety training.

Brad holds numerous national and international qualifications in the areas of officer safety (defensive tactics) and tactical communications.

In 2007 (while still employed with Fisheries) he established CERT Systems Limited, a private company to deliver top quality training to enforcement and compliance offices across NZ.

Since its establishment CERT as a 'one man band' delivering training on days off etc, it has grown to having a team of trainers throughout NZ and Australia that delivers training and supplies equipment to in excess of 60 organisations.

Rather than only training compliance and enforcement officers, CERT now delivers training to a wide range of people who interact with people across a variety of relationships. Put simply, CERT trains and equips 'people who deal with people' – especially where a potential for conflict exists.

CERT holds contracts with numerous Government and private organisations to deliver situational safety and tactical communications related training. Recently, CERT was appointed by to deliver their 'Unruly Passenger Management Training' to all Air New Zealand Cabin Crew.

After living and working in Ecuador and Australia, he settled in Aotearoa and began his career in Animal Management, quickly becoming a respected leader in the field.

In addition, Ben supports digital harm resilience, helping staff navigate challenging online interactions, maintain healthy boundaries, and strengthen their ability to work safely in increasingly complex digital environments.

Ben's approach is rooted in the principles of *manaakitanga*, *whanaungatanga*, and holistic wellbeing. As a husband and proud father, he lives by the values of connection, compassion, and balance, values that inform both his personal life and professional practice.

CERT Masterclass Training Wednesday 23 September

CERT Systems Limited was established in 2007 by a former Fisheries Officer with a vision to deliver high-quality training to enforcement and compliance professionals across New Zealand. What began as a one-person operation delivering training around regular work commitments has grown into a respected organisation with a team of specialist trainers operating throughout New Zealand and Australia, providing training and equipment to more than 60 organisations.

CERT currently delivers situational safety and tactical communication training to numerous government and private sector organisations, including Air New Zealand, where they were selected to provide Unruly Passenger Management Training to all cabin crew. Their mission is to maximise the safety, effectiveness, and professionalism of the people they train.

Masterclass Topics

This specialised masterclass will provide participants with advanced practical skills and knowledge in areas including:

- Understanding and managing interactions with Sovereign Citizens
- Effectively communicating with emotional, distressed, and difficult individuals
- Building personal and professional resilience in demanding roles
- Exploring best-practice approaches for engaging and interviewing children in enforcement and investigative settings (subject to final programme confirmation)

Designed for officers and professionals who routinely interact with the public, this masterclass will provide valuable tools and techniques to confidently manage challenging situations while maintaining professionalism and personal safety.

Programme Overview.

“Working With Stock, Not Against Them”

Presenter: Clarke Trethowen

Working with stock, not against them, focuses on the practical principles and techniques of safe and effective stock handling. Participants will learn what to do, and what not to do, when working around stock, including animal behaviour, how to position yourself safely, and how to use calm, low-stress handling techniques. Participants will learn about species-specific behaviour characteristics of commonly encountered stock, including how these behavioural differences influence movement, handling techniques, risk assessment, and safe working practices.

The session will highlight common mistakes that can increase risk to people and stock, such as rushing animals, poor positioning, excessive noise, and inappropriate handling techniques. Participants will also learn best practice approaches for achieving safe, humane, and efficient handling outcomes, and will be encouraged to share experiences, ask questions, and engage in discussions that will help build confidence and knowledge.

“Recognising and Responding to High-Risk Environments - Gang and Methamphetamine Awareness”

Presenter: Exodus Letele

This session provides an introduction to gang awareness in New Zealand, giving participants a foundational understanding of gang presence, indicators, and associated risks that may be encountered during field work. Topics include common gang paraphernalia, visual identifiers such as patches, symbols, tattoos, graffiti, vehicles, and other property indicators that may suggest gang affiliation or activity. Participants will also explore behavioural and

environmental cues that can assist with risk assessment and discuss the importance of appropriately flagging properties to help ensure staff safety and preparedness.

The second half of the session focuses on methamphetamine laboratory awareness, covering common signs of potential clandestine drug manufacture, associated hazards, and the appropriate actions to take if a suspected meth lab is encountered. Throughout the session, the emphasis will be on recognising indicators, maintaining personal safety, understanding reporting requirements, and knowing when to seek assistance from the appropriate agencies.

Information Under Scrutiny: Privacy and LGOIMA

Presenter: Aaron Neary

This session provides an overview of privacy obligations and information management responsibilities within local government, focusing on the Privacy Act 2020 and the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act (LGOIMA). Participants will learn how to appropriately collect, record, store, use, and share information, as well as best practice note-taking and record-keeping standards. The session will highlight the importance of creating accurate, objective, and professional records that may be subject to information requests, investigations, legal proceedings, or public scrutiny.

Participants will also gain an understanding of the role of the Ombudsman, the process for managing official information requests, and the potential consequences of privacy breaches or poor information management. Through discussion of high-profile incidents and real-world examples, the session will explore the reputational, legal, and organisational impacts of information handling failures, while providing practical guidance to help staff meet their responsibilities and maintain public trust.

“Compassion Fatigue: Caring Without Losing Yourself”

Presenter: Ben Cameron-Strickland

Animal Management professionals regularly face emotionally demanding situations, including responding to animal attacks, caring for impounded animals, supporting distressed owners and victims, and managing aggressive members of the public. Over time, this continual exposure can lead to compassion fatigue, affecting wellbeing, resilience, and job performance.

This session will provide participants with a practical understanding of compassion fatigue, including its causes, warning signs, and impact on both personal wellbeing and professional performance. Participants will explore how compassion fatigue differs from stress and burnout, identify early indicators in themselves and others, and learn evidence-based strategies to strengthen resilience, establish healthy boundaries, and maintain emotional wellbeing.

By increasing awareness and providing practical tools, this seminar aims to help participants sustain their passion for the work they do, protect their wellbeing, and continue delivering effective and compassionate services to their communities over the long term.

“Social media and Digital Harm: Protecting Wellbeing in the Online World”.

Presenter: Ben Cameron-Strickland

Digital harm is an increasing challenge for frontline workers, with social media, online forums, and digital communication platforms creating new opportunities for abuse, harassment, threats, and public criticism. For Animal Management professionals, difficult enforcement decisions, investigations, and high-profile incidents can attract negative online attention that impacts both personal and professional wellbeing. Repeated exposure to harmful online behaviour can lead to stress, anxiety, reduced confidence, concerns for personal safety, and decreased job satisfaction.

This workshop explores the nature and impact of digital harm, relevant legislation and reporting pathways, and practical strategies for staying safe online. Participants will learn how to protect their personal information, manage online interactions professionally, respond appropriately to harmful communications, and access support when incidents occur. The session also highlights ways to support colleagues experiencing digital harm, helping to build individual resilience and a safer, more supportive workplace in an increasingly connected world.

Impounding Stock & Establishing a Temporary Pound

Join Karan Whyte, Animal Control Officer, for a practical and informative training session focused on the safe and effective impounding of livestock and the establishment of temporary pounds.

Drawing on real-world experience, Karan will guide participants through the legal requirements, planning considerations, animal welfare responsibilities, health and safety obligations, and logistical challenges associated with stock impoundments. The session will also cover the key steps involved in setting up and managing a temporary pound, including site selection, facilities, record keeping, and working with stock owners and stakeholders.

Designed for Animal Control Officers and those involved in stock management and enforcement activities, this session will provide practical tools, lessons learned, and best practice approaches to help attendees confidently manage stock impoundments from start to finish.

“Reform of the Dog Control Act 1996 – Be the Voice – Workshop”

The Government's review of the Dog Control Act presents a rare opportunity to influence the future of dog management in New Zealand. This interactive workshop invites NZIAM conference attendees to contribute their insights, experiences, and ideas on the changes they would like to see reflected in the legislation.

Through facilitated discussion and collaborative engagement, participants will identify key challenges, opportunities, and priorities for reform from an animal management perspective. The collective feedback gathered during the session will be compiled and shared with the Ministry for Cities, Environment, Regions and Transport as the voice of NZIAM, helping to ensure that the expertise of practitioners working at the frontline of dog control is represented in the review process.

Join us to help shape practical, effective, and future-focused legislation that supports safer communities, responsible dog ownership, and positive outcomes for people and animals across New Zealand.

Workshop: Working with Homeless Dog Owners and Partner Agencies

This interactive workshop will provide an opportunity for participants to share experiences, challenges, and successful approaches when working with people experiencing homelessness who own dogs.

Many councils are increasingly engaging with complex situations involving vulnerable community members, their animals, and a range of support agencies. Through facilitated discussion, attendees will explore how different councils work alongside organisations such as Kāinga Ora, social service providers, animal welfare groups, health services, and community organisations to achieve positive outcomes for both people and their dogs.

The focus of this session is on learning from one another, discussing practical solutions, and identifying best practices that balance animal welfare, public safety, housing needs, and community wellbeing.

Dog Control Act Review: Updates, Process and What Happens Next

Join Allie Chau, Senior Policy Analyst, Operational Policy (Local Government), Ministry for Cities, Environment, Regions and Transport, for an update on the Government's review of the Dog Control Act.

This session will provide an overview of the review process, the key issues under consideration, and the progress made to date. Allie will discuss the objectives of the review, the challenges and opportunities being examined, what's involved in developing legislative change, and the expected timeframes for consultation, decision-making, and implementation. Attendees will gain valuable insight into the policy considerations shaping the review and the potential implications for councils, Animal Control Officers, and the wider community, as well as an opportunity to better understand the role local government plays in informing policy development and implementing legislative reform.
